



Buddy Myer played shortstop and second base for the Senators 1925-1927 and again 1929-1941. He won the American League batting title in 1935 with a .349 average, and he batted .300 or better in eight full seasons, retiring with a career average of .303. A patient hitter, he walked more than twice as many times as he struck out.

George Case did not live at the Broadmoor, but he frequented the Art Deco Bar with his fellow ballplayers and brought his children to pediatrician Dr. Elizabeth Chickering who practiced in the Broadmoor.



Considered baseball's fastest player between the 1920s and 1950s, Case is the only player to lead the major league in stolen bases five consecutive times (1939-1943). His 349 career steals ranked ninth in American League history at the end of his career and were the most by any player from 1930 to 1960. Case played for the Senators from 1939 to 1945 and again in 1947 and his 321 steals with the Senators were the third most in Washington history, behind only his coach Clyde Milan and Outfielder Sam Rice.
